CanAssist projects in 2015

St Catherine School, Siaya District, Kenya

CanAssist constructed three new classrooms, and installed a latrine and water-tank early in 2015. Later in the year we provided funding for classroom furnishings.

Hope School, Mbita, Kenya

In addition to helping the school with legal work to secure a deed for the school property, CanAssist has funded construction of desks and chairs for this school in Mbita, Kenya.

SP Geddes ECDC, Osiri Village, Kenya

CanAssist has helped to expand the school property and to construct two new ferro-cement classrooms at this school in Osiri Village in Kenya. In addition, CanAssist friends, Gabriella Zamojski and Marcia O'Brien initiated a weekly feeding program for the school.



Kaswanga School, Rusinga Island, Kenya

CanAssist has provided two, 10,000 litre water tanks for this Girls Secondary School on Rusinga Island, Kenya.

Adam Nkuyan School, Rift Valley, Kenya

With specific help from the Grey Gates Foundation in British Columbia, CanAssist has provided improved Teachers' accommodation at this remote school in the Kenya.

Hope for Youth School, Mukono, Uganda

Over several months in 2015, CanAssist has funded construction of a large Teachers' Accommodation building at this school in Uganda. Funding for this project has come from a charity dinner held in Nanaimo in February 2015 and from donations from the Greene Family Education Initiative in Vancouver B.C.



Kamin Oningo fishing community, Kenya

New shower/washroom facilities were constructed at this Kenyan fishing village on the shores of Lake Victoria.

Buzagazi School, Uganda

With specific help from the Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario, CanAssist constructed two new classrooms at this school in Uganda.



Kadok School, Uganda

CanAssist constructed latrines at this small secondary school in rural Uganda.

Kabuhinzi School, Ukerewe Island, Tanzania

Two classrooms were constructed in early 2015 at this small Tanzanian community in Ukerewe Island in Lake Victoria



Kanyala Little Stars, Rusinga Island, Kenya

CanAssist continued to fund improvements to classrooms at the Kanyala Little Stars school on Rusinga Island.

Ndori community, Kenya

CanAssist funded installation of water tanks and latrines at three schools in Siaya District of Kenya, Wambua Elementary School, Obwaya Primary School, and Nyalunya Secondary School

Ramula Secondary School, Kenya

Two water storage tanks were installed at the Ramula Secondary School in Siaya, Kenya.

Olimai Clinic, Uganda

CanAssist funded installation of latrines at the Olimai Health Centre in rural Uganda.


2015 Financial Summary

We keep our Canadian administration expenses as low as possible. There are unavoidable expenses including accountant fees, liability insurance, postage, internet, phone, bank service fees). We pay no Canadian salaries and all Canadian supporters travel at their own expense.

Any expenses to implement our projects in Africa are necessary to ensure successful completion and are paid to Africans.

When we have fundraising events, like our CanEscape wine event in June 2015, there are expenditures that are included in our Fundraising Events costs. Fundraising events both help us to acquire income directly but also are necessary to promote what we do and expand our donor base.

Our African Field Representative, Daniel Otieno, is essential to the work we do throughout East Africa. In addition to handling transfer of money from Canada to our African associate communities, Dan handles questions and concerns from our partners, evaluates progress of our projects and has made visits to most of the communities where we worked in 2015 in Kenya and Uganda. His responsible dedication to CanAssist work is appreciated and we commend and thank him for the work he does on our behalf.

We are always happy to provide contact information to anyone traveling in Kenya, Uganda or Tanzania who may want to visit our community associates. They are also always eager for a visit. This makes a more personal connection with our associate communities rather than just sending funds and also allows us to have some on-the-ground assessment and report on progress and future needs.



Challenges

CanAssist receives requests for funding from African schools, clinics and communities every week. The need is endless. Our capacity to fill that need is limited by both our financial and organizational resources. The falling Canadian dollar on the international market has also made the infrastructure work that we do more expensive to manage.

We have a number of established community associate groups who have demonstrated their capacity to carry out our work responsibly and efficiently. They all have a list of needs or wants and we have leaned toward supporting this scattered group of associates preferentially since we have a successful track record in dealing with them. We do entertain requests from new communities but our list of upcoming projects is long and will take both money and energy to complete.

We ended 2015 with a surplus, a relief after years of scrambling to fund the work that we promise. We are glad that we have some reserve funds to allow us to move ahead with the list of projects that we would like to tackle over the next few months. Of course, we want to keep that reserve somewhat intact as well so we are not thwarted by lack of funds when we have a worthy project to support.

We have taken care to be sure that all of our projects are completed according to our agreements and standards. Our African Field Representative, Dan Otieno, has been more involved with follow-up and surveillance over the past year and has been given more authority and responsibility. We feel a duty to ensure that our donors' gifts are properly spent and that the communities who receive help are both aware of this generosity and encouraged to look after the infrastructure we have provided. Our policy is that we will stop interacting with communities or groups where we have not been able to have reliable cooperation or reporting.

CanAssist improves water and sanitation in East Africa

Throughout July 2014 we had our Annual Canada Day Challenge. Thanks to a matching donation from the Sasamat Foundation in Vancouver, we were able to raise over \$35000 that we have since disbursed to provide water and sanitation facilities at several schools and clinics.

The improvements we have funded will have impacted the lives of literally thousands of children and adults in Kenya and Uganda.

The need is ever-present. How can young children learn about the importance of sanitation, hand washing and drinking clean water when their schools have inadequate latrines and get drinking water from muddy ponds?

Water and sanitation initiatives will remain a priority for several of our projects in 2015-16.

CanAssist aiding local economy in rural Africa

When CanAssist builds a classroom or a latrine, or constructs school furnishings in Africa, the project purchases the materials locally and employs local labor. So, in addition to providing the designated infrastructure to the community, we are helping boost the local economy.

Amuge Akol is one of our associates in Olimai, Uganda where we are currently constructing two latrines at

a clinic where previously the toilets were falling apart and full. She recently reported that, in addition to improving the sanitation for staff and patients, the project has given several people work. "The project has provided 3 months employment to 12 people who otherwise would probably not send their kids to school this term or have no income for their families."

The total cost to accomplish this, to CanAssist donors, by the way has been a meagre \$6000.

We are proud of the work we do in Africa and how it helps our friends there in several ways.

We thank our donors, on behalf of these African villages, for their ongoing support.
